Grading Activities: Your final grade will be based upon attendance, and you can earn additional points up to the grade you desire. Each project, essay, quiz, or test is assigned a set number of points. Although there is the potential of many more than 100 points, you only need to earn as many points as you want. Point/grades are assigned as follows: 100-90=A, 89-80=B, 79-70=C, 69 below =F.

Projects: Depending on the quality of the project; not all available points may be awarded. There are three types of projects:

Costume Presentation (20 Points): Create and present a 10-15 minute presentation on period costume for one of the periods covered in class. Details on the required content of this presentation are on the forums.

Furniture (10 Points): Model and texture furniture piece.

Architecture (15 Points): Model and texture room (no furniture) or the exterior of a building.

Complete Scene (40 Points): Model, texture, light and render reproduction of famous architectural space (interior). May be rendered in either Maya (VRay/Arnold) or Unity/Unreal.

NOTE: All projects must first be proposed on the forums (complete with research before beginning). Approval must be awarded **one week** previous to project due date.

Quizzes: Each quiz is potentially worth 1 points (25 pts total)

Exam: Each exam is potentially worth 35 points (70 pts total)

Attendance: Attendance is mandatory. Every missed class will result in a loss of 10 points.
